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Kate Lester's clients came to her with a few simple requests for their new-construction house—that the home be fun, functional, comfortable, and reflective of their personalities. Bonus, they didn't shy away from color or pattern—the designer's M.O.—and were excited when warned some elements might be a little outside the box. "They didn't want a cookie-cutter home," Kate explains.

"They wanted something curated and truly personal."

Kate's firm, Kate Lester Interiors, was hired in 2019. "Our clients had been living in the original tiny beach cottage and were working on plans to demolish it and start fresh," she recalls. Her team helped with everything from layouts and window placements to designing the bathrooms, living spaces, and kitchen. "I think the com-

mon misconception is that designers only come in after to 'do the pretty,' but our team always comes on board very early to be involved in every design selection, from windows to baseboards and lighting to switchplate covers. We are very annoying and detail-oriented, but I think in the end, knowing your design directive and making sure every element is working toward that creates a much more cohesive end result."

Kate infuses her work with a sense of humor, coming up with quippy descriptions for her signature style, like #Spanifornia and #TradlsRad. "We call this one 'East Meets West," she says. "The original architectural design concept was a play on a traditional brownstonestyle home you may frequently see on the East Coast, but it was our job to infuse some 'California cool' so the home didn't feel too serious or stuffy. At one point, we were even jokingly calling it 'Project Pete Davidson'

"We were calling it 'Project Pete Davidson' because it was a little New York, a little LA, and a little outside the box!"




COMING UP ROSES

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The clients wanted to celebrate the relaxed, coastal vibes of Manhattan Beach, but in a thoughtful and intentional way—and they gave Kate carte blanche to do just that. "I mean, isn't it a designer's dream to be like, 'Hey, I want to paint your dining room a dusty green and then do purple-y pink wallpaper... cool?' And have your client be like, 'Yeah, sounds perfect!"

It was a long process—the pandemic hitting smack in the middle of construction—but the designer is accustomed to going with the flow. "There was a bit of reselecting and some redesigning with new materials, but that's part of the challenge. As I always say at home: 'Perfect is boring.' The obstacles always push our team and, I think, make us stronger and more creative designers!"
